Monda~6th januar~ 1902
The Raja takes a lively interest in our work. He wants his own face to be improved and we can easily do it from life. The house we live in overlooks the sea and there is a cold wind blowing from it constantly.

T uesda~ 7th januar~ 1902
This evening we visited two shops one of a Parsee and the other of a native. The latter was full stocked with things and we are not a little pleased to see there all of our oleographs exposed for sale. They are popular.

Wednesda~ 8th januar~ 1902
We improved the Raja's face and pUt on some more jewels on the Rani. The Raja takes very keenly to heart her death. She was the second daughter of Maharaja Gajapathy Rao a big candid proprietor of his district.

Thursda~ 9th januar~ 1902
We drove through Vizag and walked up- a hill on the top of which is a Roman Catholic Church. The scenery from the hill was extremely charming. The town lay at our feet with the sea beyond.

Frida~ 1 oth januar~ 1902
This evening we had a pleasant drive with the Raja in his four in hand. He seems to be a good driver and managed the horses capitally. In the afternoon we paid the Raja a formal visit in his palace.

5aturda~ 11th januar~ 1902
From a general observation of this part of the country and its people it might be said they are behind Southern India in civilization. In the fine arts and industry too, they are behind the people of SoUthern India.

5unda~ 1 2th januar~ 1902
We had a Telugu cook178 to prepare our supper. The dishes were unlike those of the Tamil Countries and yet they were good.

Monda~ 1 )th januar~ 1902
This evening we paid a visit to the Lunatic Asylum. It contains aboUt 70' inmates of whom about 17 are females. Four of the more violent characters were confined in cells barred with iron railings.

T uesda~ 1 +th januar~ 1902
This evening we drove to a garden at the fort of a hill belonging to a gentleman of Bimlipatam. 179 There we met several of the leading
